Rector's Writ

The season of Pentecost is the longest season of our Church year and quite possibly the least understood. On the day of Pentecost the church celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit bestowed not only on the apostles but the promised gift for all who believe and "call on the name of the Lord." The original gathering took place 50 days after Easter. Pentecost was derived from the Greek name of the Jewish Festival of Weeks, which began seven weeks after the Passover. For the apostles and for us, Pentecost (June 12th this year) became the day the gift of the Holy Spirit arrived, just as Jesus had assured them. Jesus had not promised WHEN the Holy Spirit (also known as the Paraclete, guide, and counselor) would be sent. Yet, more reliable than Fed Ex, the Spirit arrived dramatically around 9am on the day of Pentecost...and stayed. Since this event marked the beginning of the apostles 'going public' with the gospel, it's also known as the birthday of the Christian church.

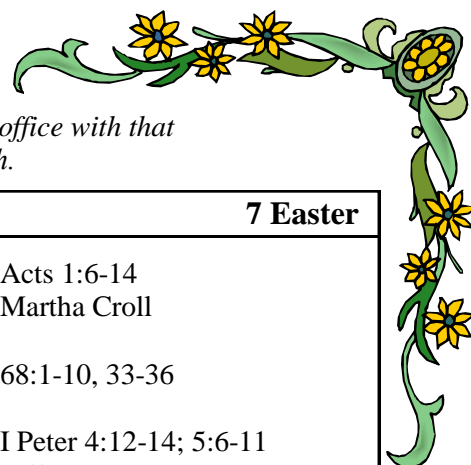
The Sunday after Pentecost we celebrate Trinity Sunday. There's no way a brief definition can explain that mystery, but it, too, is a Principal Feast in our Church year. The season of Pentecost lasts until the first Sunday of Advent. The Day of Pentecost uses red to symbolize fire and the Holy Spirit, while Trinity Sunday's color is white, reflecting joy, truth and purity. However, the liturgical color for the season of Pentecost is green. It's symbolic of the growing season, not only in farms and gardens but in our spiritual life as well. We are to recognize the Spirit's presence and explore how we as the Church become Christ's hands and heart in the world; *sharing and living* the gospel message of love, justice, and peace. It's a long season where we need practice for such discipleship and growth. We need the practice, and the Spirit provides the coaching. We receive that mentoring and nurturing in all the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit provide through worship, sacraments, and the unperfected company of those trying-to-be-faithful. We long to be part of a faith community where, *servicing and growing* together, both the community and the individual are strengthened *with and for* love, renewal, care, and hope. That ongoing call (and challenge) of LIVING by the Spirit is what has the potential to change the world...and to change us.

May this long season of Pentecost give us an awareness of the Spirit's presence, Christ's grace, and God's goodness as we share and live the gospel.

A Short History of Fathers Day

The first observance of Father's day actually took place in Fairmont, West Virginia on July 5th, 1908 to celebrate the lives of 210 fathers who had been lost in the Monongah mining disaster on December 6, 1907. On June 19, 1910 Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane Washington is credited with starting our current Father's day to honor her father who raised six children after his wife had passed away.

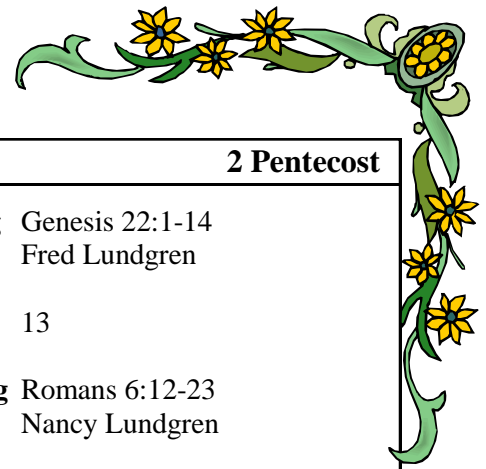
Where Mother's Day was met with enthusiasm, Father's Day was often met with laughter. It was the target of much satire and parody including jokes in the newspapers.

Several attempts to have national recognition of the

holiday had been introduced but congress resisted fearing it would be commercialized. In 1957 Maine Senator Margaret Chase Smith wrote a proposal accusing Congress of ignoring fathers for 40 years while honoring mothers.

In 1966 President Lyndon B. Johnson issued the first presidential proclamation honoring fathers, designating the third Sunday in June as Father's Day. Six years later, the day was made a permanent national holiday when President Richard Nixon signed it into law in 1972.

Father's Day is celebrated in many countries throughout the world.

Fathers (and Mothers) and Friends

*They lived not only in ages past; there are hundreds of thousands still.
The world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will.*

Cornelius Hill

June 27

So little is known about Cornelius Hill and many of the memorable dates of his life are open to debate. However, there is no question that his life had a profound impact not only on his nation, the Oneidas, but also on the mission church, the Church of the Holy Apostles in Oneida, Wisconsin. His story is interwoven with the later history of this parish.

Cornelius Hill was born in 1834 (1843?) on the Oneida Reservation in Wisconsin. His peoples had been “relocated” from their ancestral lands in Central New York State, not far from the Finger Lakes region, to the area near Fond du Lac. Intelligent, brave, and charismatic, he was already a chief of the Oneida nation by his teen years and known as Chief Onan-gwat-go, or Big Medicine. In fact, he was the first great Oneida chief to be born in Wisconsin and the last hereditary chief of the Oneida Nation.

At some point in his twenties or thirties, he came to the attention of the pastor of the former mission Church of the Holy Apostles, the Rev. Edward A. Goodnough who arranged for him to spend several years at Nashotah House Seminary, where he was educated by the Episcopal Church. The Rev. Goodnough was, himself, a tireless worker on behalf of the Oneidas and their parish church. Since the congregation had already outgrown the wooden building, the Oneidas gave one day a week to quarry stone and build the early English-style church that is still standing in use today, the Church of the Holy Apostles. This new building was consecrated in 1887. And it was here that Cornelius Hill “interpreted” the services of the Episcopal Church for his people, translating the language and explaining the actions of the Eucharist.

But all was not well. The treatment of our indigenous peoples has been a source of conflict and shame since earliest days. Of particular note at this time was the process known as “land allotment.” This practice was actually used to assimilate Native Americans into the dominant US culture by selling off their “excess” lands, lands for which the Indians did not actually have deeds of individual ownership. But the Oneidas owned all their land collectively, having a relationship with the land that was both spiritual and cultural, a relationship that the federal government chose not to acknowledge. Cornelius Hill vehemently opposed land allotment as did the Rev. Goodnough, his mentor. Although they lost the fight and the practice became federal law in the Dawes Act of 1893, the relationship between the two men deepened. Cornelius Hill was ordained to the diaconate on June 27, 1895, and to the priesthood in 1903 (1905? 1906?), becoming the first Oneida priest. He died in 1907 and is buried in the cemetery of the Church of the Holy Apostles. The title to the land where the Church of the Holy Apostles is located was not transferred to the Episcopal Diocese of Fond du Lac until an Act of Congress through patent deed in 1909.

Prayer: Everliving Lord of the universe, our loving God, you raised up your priest Cornelius Hill, last hereditary chief of the Oneida nation, to shepherd and defend his people against the attempts to scatter them in the wilderness: Help us, like him, to be dedicated to truth and honor, that we may come to that blessed state you have prepared for us; through Jesus Christ, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.

Editor's note: I had a major case of “small world syndrome” reading this article. After my father left St. Alban's parish in Marshfield, Wisconsin where I grew up, he served this very parish as Rector from 1994-98. Marcia and I have been to service in this smaller parish with its wonderful stone building, very reminiscent of ours here at Grace on the inside. He enjoyed his time there with the Oneida as he is of very similar mindset on matters of the land and nature. The Oneida continue in their strong faith and we can report that, as might be expected of Native Americans, they share my father's love of incense!
